- AU Student Pharmacy (AUSP)**- fills 150 prescriptions per day on average (seasonal changes in volume based on academic year enrollment). Serves as an experiential training site for early and advance pharmacy student training in community pharmacy practice (trains approximately twenty fourth year (P4) advanced practice experience (APE), 10 first year (P1) introductory practice experience IPPE students, and 3 PHS PGY-1 Ambulatory Care Residents per year). AUSP employees include PHS Coordinator of Distributive Services who is in charge of all three pharmacies (and Pharmacist in Charge of the AUSP); PGY-1 PHS resident (0.2 FTE); Lead Tech (1.0 FTE); three part-time technicians; 2 interns; and several delivery drivers (shared between AUSP and AUEP). Gross Revenue ranges between \$1.1 to \$1.5 million dollars per year. Clinical services provided include weight management, smoking cessation, specialized compounding, MTM consultation. Medication Use Evaluation (MUE) projects are conducted on prescribing patterns of AU Medical clinic prescribers, and results of these analyses are shared with the Director of the AU Medical Clinic and the medical staff. AUSP pharmacists and employees develop collaborative relationships with AUMC prescribers and employees.

AU Employee Pharmacy (AUEP)- fills 250-280 prescriptions per day on average. Serves as a community experiential training site for IPPE, APE, and PHS Residents. AUEP employees include Coordinator of Distributive Services (0.1 FTE); Pharmacist in Charge / Lead Pharmacist for AUEP (1.0 FTE); PGY-1 PHS resident (0.2 FTE); Lead Tech (1.0 FTE); Technicians (2.0 FTE); 2 part-time techs; 2 interns; and several delivery drivers (shared between AUEP and AUEP). Gross Revenue is \$3.6 million dollars per year. Clinical services provided in the AUEP include weight management, smoking cessation, specialized compounding, MTM consultation, medication cost analysis, med-sync program, adherence programs, and referrals to AUPCC (located adjacent to AUEP) for extended MTM programs and monitoring. AUEP serves as a site for community pharmacy research for PHS, HORP, and IPE projects. The model of care implemented in the AUEP blends distributive and clinical services and is designed to serve as an advanced practice model that positions the pharmacists to be actively engaged in monitoring the outcomes of medication use among the AUEP population. The practice is designed so the pharmacists conducts baseline MTM consultations upon patient transfer to the AUEP for medication services; identification of potential or real medication-related problems (MRPs) during MTM consultation; development of patient-specific action plans at the time of consultation; prioritization of the MRPs; and continuous patient monitoring to ensure resolution of MRPs. AU Pharmaceutical Care Center (AUPCC)- The first free-standing, pharmaceutical care center located within a school of pharmacy that focuses on providing advanced health and wellness services, MTM services, and pharmaceutical care to the university's own self-insured employee population. During 2009 provided 1,000 flu shots and 5,300 H₁N₁ shots to the Auburn University family. Today, the AUPCC provides advanced pharmaceutical care for 125 patients per week on average. This includes medication therapy management consultations (polypharmacy, medication training, pharmacoconomics, health and wellness screenings, etc.), pharmacotherapy monitoring (INR, Hgb A1C, etc.), and health risk assessments and management (osteoporosis screenings, cholesterol measurement, PPD skin tests, etc.). Serves as advanced pharmacy student training site for primary care (trains approximately twenty P4 student pharmacists per year); serves as longitudinal primary care training site for AU HSOP / EAMC PGY-1 residency (3 residents per year); and serves as primary training site for PGY-1 PHS residency in ambulatory care (3 resident per year). AUPCC employees include an Ambulatory Care Pharmacist (1.0 FTE), 1 Pharmacy Practice Faculty Member (0.3 FTE); 1 VCOM Pharm.D. Faculty Member (0.4 FTE); 1 VCOM Ph.D., R.D. Faculty Member (0.2 FTE); 3 PGY-1 PHS Residents (2.4 FTE), 1 Director of Operations, 1 Auburn Practice Manager, 1 Administrative Specialist in Health and Wellness, and 1 Administrative Associate / Receptionist.

SEIB Pharmacy- Fills 100 prescriptions per day on average. Serves as a community experiential training site for IPPE, APE, and PHS Residents. SEIB Pharmacy employees include Coordinator of Distributive Services (0.1 FTE); Pharmacist in Charge / Lead Pharmacist for AUEP (1.0 FTE); PGY-1 PHS resident (0.2 FTE); Lead Tech (1.0 FTE); and a delivery driver. Gross Revenue is \$1.7 million dollars per year. Clinical services provided in the SEIB Pharmacy include MTM consultation, medication cost analysis, med-sync program, adherence programs, and referrals to SEIB Clinic (located adjacent to the SEIB Pharmacy) for extended MTM programs and monitoring. This model of care replicates the AUEP model that was developed initially at AU HSOP/PHS. It blends distributive and clinical services and is designed to serve as an advanced practice model that positions the pharmacists to be actively engaged in monitoring the outcomes of medication use among the State Employee population. The practice is designed so the pharmacists conducts baseline MTM consultations upon patient transfer to the SEIB Pharmacy

for medication services; identification of potential or real medication-related problems (MRPs) during MTM consultation; development of patient-specific action plans at the time of consultation; prioritization of the MRPs; and continuous patient monitoring to ensure resolution of MRPs. This model is taught within this practice setting to students and residents, and showcased to alums.<http://www.auburn.edu/academic/pharmacy/phs/pharmacy/seib.html>

SEIB Clinic- Developed to expand upon the AUPCC model, and includes a truly interdisciplinary team of physicians, nurse practitioners, pharmacists, pharmacy residents, pharmacy students, nurses, and operations staff to provide worksite acute care services, health and wellness services, and medication therapy management services to state employees. The State Wellness Center is managed by the AU HSOP PHS. An average of 325 patients per week are seen in the SEIB Clinic by the interdisciplinary team. Gross revenue per year is \$2.0 million.
